E-Verify - Guest Worker Program

A Congressional hearing on the E-Verify System just ended. The proponents are attempting to sell the idea that it's a necessary component for "immigration reform". Idaho's District 1 Representative Raul Labrador was obviously very interested in seeing it accepted because it will help foreign workers to work in the U.S. He's an immigration attorney originally from Puerto Rico.

E-Verify is a computer system (surprise). Theoretically, it's supposed to verify the status of a "worker" to ensure that he is legally authorized to work. The impression given by the proponents is that it is a solution to illegal immigration. That's a fraud. It isn't a solution. What it is... is the same kind of system that the European Union is using to track "immigrant workers" from country to country. The way the system works in the UK is that simply the act of doing the verification is the authorization to work. Why? Because under the European Union, country borders are virtually erased. The same is true for the US (or will be if the traitors to the United States have their way and the United States is dissolved into the North American Union).

The point is.... it's just a computer system. It is not security for anything and it's only as good as the programmers who programmed it. Experience

has it that on the subject of aliens and illegal aliens, the systems work in the favor of foreigners and against the interests of the people of the United States. I can't tell you how many hearings I've watched where they've used the dufus excuse - "problems with the system."

The point that is not being brought out is that ALL workers must be verified. At the hearing, a woman named Tully testified that there is an error rate of 30% for American citizens. They show up as not being authorized and there are no protections to keep anyone from being fired from his job - as one of the rules of E-verify is that the employer must fire the employee if he/she is not "authorized." There is no recourse if this happens. So in effect, your ability to work is dependent upon the accuracy of a system checking data that we know to be bad. Social security data is notorious for being bad because of stolen and "borrowed" social security numbers, and employers are not required to verify whether or not the prospective employee is actually the person to whom the SSI was originally assigned.

One other thing that is not being brought out: This system provides the government with the means to control the labor market. It's another nail in the coffin of a free America. The government does not want to manage a "guest worker" program without managing the domestic labor market as well. It can't be done, they say, so in effect, through E-verify, the American people are being sold out to accommodate foreigners who are taking our jobs.

JUST SAY "NO!" TO WAR WITH NORTH KOREA

Is war with North Korea inevitable? Some people are hinting that it can't be avoided. *CNN* asked retired General James Marks to explain the military strategies likely to be used by North Korea and the United States in a conflict. *Fox News* has reported on the "Foal Eagle" exercises conducted by the American military in South Korea. *ABC* reported, "it appears North Korea is on the march toward war... [On April 3, North Korea] blocked entrance to an industrial park shared with South Korea, an industrial park that generates about \$2 billion worth of revenue every year for North and South Korea." On the same day, the North Korean government warned nuclear war could begin "today or tomorrow." These threats by North Korea even have some in China scared.

South Korean Defense Minister Kim Kwan-Jin has confirmed that North Korea has moved a missile with "considerable range" to the east coast, though Kim explains the missile appears to be a mid-range variety and is likely meant for a test firing or a drill, not an actual war.

Jason Ditz from *Antiwar.com* reports, "North Korea doesn't even have



missiles capable of hitting the US coast, and its best functional missiles would make any US territory, even Guam, a long-shot."

The real question is not: will Kim Jong-un attack South Korea or attempt to attack the United States of America? The real questions is: why is the defense of South Korea the responsibility of the United States military? Pat Buchanan answers the question by saying if the American military weren't in South Korea, and if the American government weren't part of an entangling alignment with the South Korean government, "we would not be in the middle of this crisis now... U.S. policy, seemingly frozen in the 1950s, is in need of review. We cannot indefinitely be responsible for the defense of South Korea."

It is also important to remember that George W. Bush wanted to go to war with North Korea in 2002 saying that North Korea was part of the "axis of evil, arming to threaten the peace of the world."
